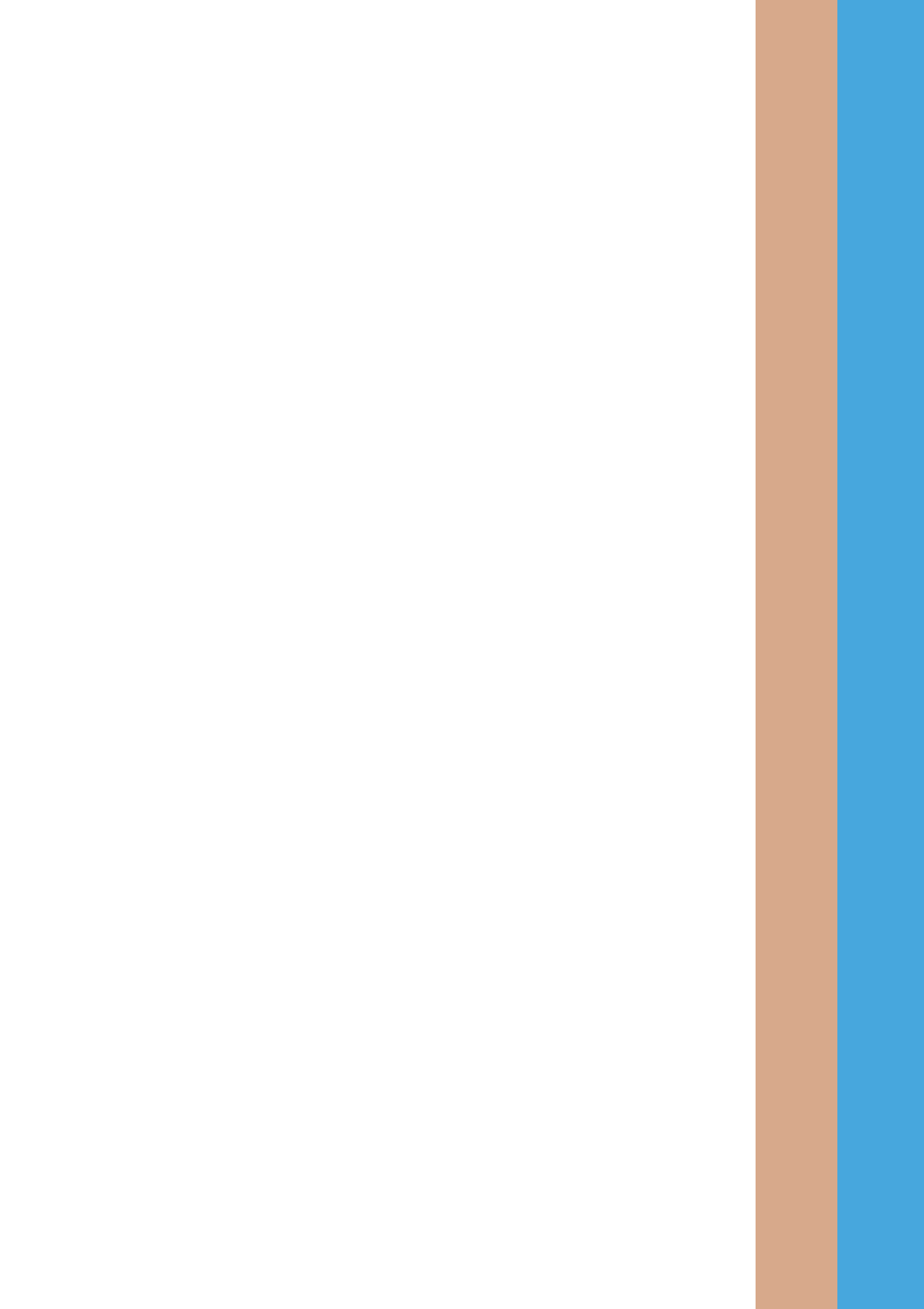


OLSBURG KANSAS

1-CUPCAKE Deep Well Veterinary Service
The early morning sunrise is a perfect time to catch a photo of “Cupcake” waiting patiently at the gate of Deep Well Veterinary Service, where Dr Ann Buchanan and Dr Kotie White lovingly care for all our four-legged family members. Dr Ann remembers her childhood and playing with her My Pretty Ponies. She chose a chestnut color with a flaxen mane and tail - complete with braid and the Deep Well brand on each hip. “Cupcake” is a striking addition to the Olsburg Dala horse herd! We hope you will be able to make plans to come and see “Cupcake” and all her friends.

5-WINNIE JOHNSON FARM

Labor Day was established as a federal holiday in 1894 to honor and celebrate all laborers who help to make America great. A beautiful drive North of Olsburg brings us to the farm of Terry and Jeannie Johnson and their absolutely gorgeous addition to our Dala horse project, “Winnie”. Artist, Jeannie Meyer Johnson, laughs and remembers while she was painting, the song, “Green Acres” kept running through her head ! “Winnie” is painted to celebrate Terry & Jeannie’s livelihood- farming, ranching and dirt work! I heard a quote recently that fits perfectly. “A farm is more than land and crops. It’s a family’s heritage and future”. Thanks to all farmers - and thanks to the Johnson’s for their great addition to our Dala herd. We love “Winnie.”



3-ANDERSON SIMON MEAT LOCKER

Standing proud in the morning sun, just East of town at Simon Meat Locker, is “Anderson” (or Andy for short). This Dala is special for so many reasons... Named for Cody’s Mom’s maiden name, “Anderson” proudly shows their family’s lineage within the Cherokee Nation. A proud Indian Chief shooting his bow and arrow toward the stars reflects their family motto which is prominent on the reverse side.

The motto of Kansas, “Ad Astra per Aspera” is Latin for “to the stars through difficulties.” Cody and Becca Simon are aiming for the stars with their new business, and we are sure they will achieve success! Becca Simon was the artist for this absolutely stunning Dala and what a wonderful tribute to family and the dreams they share.

4 -SOLIG JOHNSON – SUNFLOWER STORAGE

The early morning sunrise was again a perfect moment to snap a stunning photo of “Solig” (so-leauge). She is standing watch at the Sunflower Storage, just East of Olsburg. Jeannie Meyer Johnson tells us:

“Solig” is Swedish for Sunny. Her theme of a sunflower saddle is inspired by Sunflower Storage and Jeannie’s love of sunflowers. Co-artist Michele Johnson painted sunflowers on Solig’s legs so that wherever she is standing she looks like she is in a field of flowers. We had so much fun bringing Solig to life and hope that those who come to visit her leave with some sunnyness in their day! We think Solig will certainly bring a sunny smile to all who visit.



2-SHANNON Shannon Creek Ranch

A absolute masterpiece this one is! “Shannon” is standing proud at the home of Joseph and Shelby Hubbard. Shelby brought to life their home and livelihood with her scenes from Shannon Creek Ranch. If you love the hillside sheep scene, I can guarantee you will be equally impressed with the view from the other side! “Shannon” is another striking example of the talented artists we have in our community . 6-FAYE TEGEI THE BRICKS

It’s Friday night - and a big part of Olsburg’s history has always centered around Bricks. Please say hello to “Faye Tegel”. The word tegel translates to “Bricks” in Swedish, and Faye is a tribute to our very own Faye Brickei. She and her husband Melvin, built and operated the original Bricks. It has changed owners through the years, but it has always remained a place for good food, good drinks and even better friends. Current owners, Jim & Julie Didas write: Our Dala was painted by Dawn Maples!! She used her talents to create a textured brick look and flag design to show how much we respect, support and honor our military; past, present and future... “Home of the free because of the brave!” We think “Faye Tegel” is a dazzling example of hometown pride and a wonderful tribute to all the great men and women who keep us free.





7-SAUL ZAUL BLUE VALLEY ELECTRIC

Need a handy-dala for all your fix-it needs? Blue Valley Electric has you covered with the latest addition to our Dala horse parade! Introducing this handsome fella, "Saul Zaul". Equipped with tool belt, tape measure along with some great embellishments, this horse is ready to help with your next project. Artist, Martha Turner, along with help from family , saw their vision come

to life with "Saul Zaul". Clark and Vida Blockcolsky owned and operated the lumberyard for many years, and now Martha, Lyle and Laura are continuing the legacy. We love "Saul Zaul" . Please make plans to come and see all the beautiful Dala horses! We welcome you!!

8-WELCOME to Olsburg... or should I say VALKOMMEN!

This cool and groovy Dala horse goes by the name "Ole" (pronounced Oh-Lee). Olsburg was founded as a town in 1880, but the history of the area shows Ole Thrulson gave Olesburgh (later shortened to Olsburg) it's name. We are truly one of a kind... there is no other Olsburg in the US! I chose a simple design and brought color into "Ole's" saddle with a colorful mirrored daisy effect. Ole" will welcome you as you come to town - he hopes you'll stop and see all the horses!



9- CHRISTIAN JOHN WESLEY METHODIST CHURCH

Our Dala tour continues with "Christian John Wesley", named for the founder of The Methodist Church. Roy Hanni, artist, brought to life the emblems and colors that reflect the founding and beliefs of Methodism. The cross and flame along with the green altar cloth, signifying ordinary times within the church calendar make up this beautiful Dala. We think "Christian John Wesley" is anything but ordinary! I found a

quote by John Wesley that really spoke to me...

"Do all the good you can. By all the means you can. In all the ways you can. In all the places you can. At all the times you can. To all the people you can. As long as ever you can."

10-LIBERTY American Legion

This is “Liberty”, a horse created by Olsburg resident Chad Wilson. Chad Tells us:

“The colors red white and blue obviously represent this country and what it represents is freedom and liberty. Liberty is something people sometimes take for granted today even more so now. I always hope that people seeing the red white and blue will always remember...Remember to take appreciation for their country. I know I appreciate the people who sacrificed everything so we can live free today.” We love seeing Liberty in front of the American Legion!



11-ASTRID LIBRARY

Thursday means library day in Olsburg! This Dala was given a special name by the artist, Rochelle Chaney, who is an assistant librarian in St Mary’s. Rochelle writes:

“The name I wanted to give her was “Astrid the... “ (incredible/adventurous) something along those lines. My inspiration for her was childlike wonder/imagination/magic because that’s the way libraries and books made me feel as a child.”

Astrid is a stunning addition to our community’s art project. We hope she inspires you too!

12-HERITAGE CITY HALL

This handsome fella is aptly named “Heritage”. Co-Artist and City Clerk, Jeannie Johnson talks about the heritage passed down from our founders. Their care and love for our community is so special and still shown today. We are a community of doers! The original settlers of this area could have kept going in their trek to find new homes, but something about this beautiful land stopped them and they set down roots. The design is mimicked to look like old suitcases, where stickers from each place visited would be placed to show where you came from. We come from Olsburg and couldn’t be prouder . Come and see “Heritage” and the many other Dala’s that have set up roots.



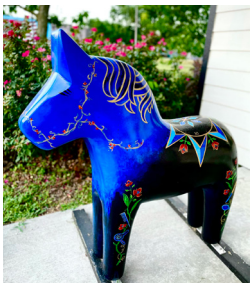


13-STAMPS Post Office

14-WILHELM TELL Roy & Lori Hanni

This beautiful Dala really caught my eye. Artists Roy and Lori Hanni found their inspiration in their heritage. “Wilhelm Tell” reflects their professional painting business and Roy’s Swiss lineage. “Wilhelm Tell” is named in honor of the Swiss Farmer who stood up against the tyranny of the day in Switzerland in 1307, and who inspired and was a part of the bonding together of the first 3 Cantons (which would be like our States) against the Tyrannical Dictator of the time, to which later other Cantons also joined together to form what we know today as the Country of Switzerland!



15-FAMILY TRADITIONS

Reona Johnson with collaboration with Janel Finan produced this stunning Dala named “Family Traditions”. Janel’s love of this color blue, along with tools of her trade as a hairdresser inspired the intricate design, while Reona added details to reflect her business, Bittersweet Lane Candles & Gifts. “Family Traditions” is more than just a

name - Janel’s grandmother, Dorothy Johnson owned and operated the beauty shop and Janel followed in her footsteps. It’s truly a beautiful example of the traditions this family shares. Please plan a visit to Olsburg soon to see all the pretty horses.

16-ESTHER WILLIAMS Swimming Pool

Another Dala has found her way to her permanent home. Meet “Esther Williams”, the pool Dala. She’s on her surf board and ready to hang 10 - right into the pool. She boasts a design mimicking the pool liner and is complete with her very own cap! Many thanks to the Swimmin Women for their wonderful skills , both in and out of the water!



17-TWILA JEAN

Linda Kasselmann, owner and operator of Linda’s 1st Street Salon was the artist for this very special Dala. “Twila Jean”, named for Linda’s grandma, is a lasting tribute to a very special lady. Linda chose her color palette to match that of her salon, and the design includes tools of her profession. At the urging of a friend, she added the bright floral designs to bring a taste of traditional Dala design into her creation. On each hip “Twila Jean” boasts the autographs of her two great-grandsons. Linda, you did an amazing job!



18-SVEN Lutheran Church

The late afternoon rays of the sun were a perfect opportunity to take a photo of “Sven”. Standing to greet all who come to worship at the Olsburg Lutheran Church, “Sven” is a awe-inspiring addition to our Dala horse project.

Lee Cantrell, artist, tells of his inspiration:

“Sven” reminds us that the Olsburg Lutheran Church was established in Olsburg in 1881, and is still a part of our community. The religious symbols on the horse remind us that is God is Alpha and Omega meaning that He is with us at the beginning of our life as well as the end of our life. The cross symbolizes Christ’s death on the cross. The flowers are part of traditional Swedish design.”

Olsburg Lutheran Church was established in the spring of 1881 as a sister church to Mariadahl Lutheran Church which was displaced by Tuttle Creek Reservoir. Worship services were held in the school house until 1886 when the first church building was completed. In 1939 the present church building held its first services.





19-ROOTS UNION BANK

Another photo opportunity too beautiful to pass up! Meet "Roots", the history Dala. This horse is covered with photos, newspaper clippings and tidbits about Olsburg dating back to 1877- even before Olsburg was recognized as a town! I learned so much about our wonderful community while working on this project. Come and see - you may be part of the history revealed

20-HOPE Jeff & Tami Howland Home

I recently read the meaning the word "Hope"; "to cherish a desire with anticipation". I could think of no better name for the Howland Family Dala. At our home, we have "Hope". She watches over our little hillside and stands guard in our driveway, welcoming family and visitors alike. I chose bright, cheery colors and added the brand that Granny and Grandpa had for years. She is a constant reminder that we all should have a little Hope, in our hearts and minds.



21-PRAIRIE WIND

A short drive down Booth Creek brought me to "Prairie Wind", a beautiful Dala created by artist, Irene Johnson. Irene, along with husband Rick, own and operate Prairie Wind Gardens. Irene chose the traditional red color for the Dala and decorated with detailed paintings of hearty perennials found in Kansas - and her gardens! Especially in the month of July, their yard explodes with color from all different varieties of daylillies. It's truly breathtaking.

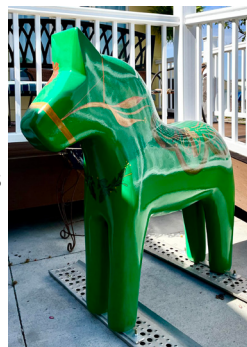
"Prairie Wind" looks West over the Kansas prairie - standing proud amidst the beautiful landscape.

Diana had a Swedish horse they took inspiration from, but Oksana is to be given full credit for the stunning result. She is obviously a very talented artist. SAUL is a wonderful example of honoring the love they share SAUL can be seen gracing the driveway of Jim & Diana’s home in Olsburg.

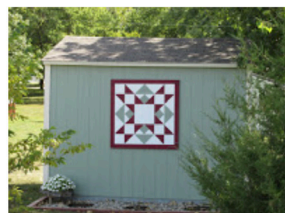
